

Hill Stations Tamia, Pachmari & Patalkot are popularly known as **THE JEWELS OF SATPURA**

Tamia Hills

are around 65 km from Chhindwara. The steep hills, dense forests and big winding ghats have all combined to make Tamia a beauty spot and a tourist place. A PWD rest house is picturesquely situated on a steep hill

commanding an extensive view of the deep forests and mountainous ranges of Satpura notably Mahadeo and Chaura Pahad in the background. The view from the rest house is noted for its constantly shifting natural scenery which is inspiring to visitors. The sunrise and sunset scenes give a breath taking experience to the visitors. About 1.5 km from this bungalow there is a cave where in the holy 'Shivling' (the deity of Lord Shiva) of 'Chota Mahadev' exists. Just beside the cave is a small water fall. Both of these provide a feast to the eyes of the visitors.

In significance to Sahajayoga, once Shri Mataji's mother while pregnant, desired to see a tiger. So, the family went for tiger sighting to Tamia. On seeing the tigress, Shri Mataji's father aimed the gun to shoot the tigress. But Shri Mataji's mother desisted not to shoot her, as the tigress was also pregnant. The very next moment, the tigress came towards her, bowed (the Adishakti in her womb) to her and went away.



Patalkot

Patalkot in the hilly block 'Tamia' of Chhindwara District, has acquired great importance because of its geographical and scenic beauty. Patalkot is a lovely landscape at a depth of 1200-1500 feet in a valley. Because of the great depth, this place is christened as 'Patalkot' (patal means very deep, in Sanskrit). When one looks down from the top of the valley, the place looks like a horseshoe in shape. Earlier, people believed it as the entrance to 'Patal'. There is one more belief that after worshipping 'Lord Shiva' Prince Meghnath had gone to Patal-lok through this place only. People say that this place was ruled by kings in 18th and 19th centuries and that there was a long tunnel connecting this place to 'Pachmarhi' in Hoshangabad District. Because of the inaccessibility of the area, the tribals of this region were totally cut off from the civilized world. But, with the constant efforts being made by the government, tribals of this area started tasting the advantages of adopting civilized life. 'Patalkot' is attracting many tourists because of its geographical location, scenic beauty, culture of the people who live here and the immense and rare herbal wealth.



Pachmarhi

Pachmarhi is Madhya Pradesh's most verdant jewel, a place where nature has found exquisite expression in myriad enchanting ways. Green shades embrace the mountains, and everywhere is heard the gentle murmur of flowing water. Bridle paths lead into tranquil forest glades; groves of wild bamboo and jamun, dense sal forests and delicate bamboo thickets.

The valley, ravines and maze of gorges, sculpted in red sandstone by the wind and weather, add their own colouring to this palette of shades, and cascading waterfalls flash silver in the sunshine.

Deep azure pools are hidden delights and every where wildlife watchers will be rewarded by fascinating glimpses of the animal and bird kingdoms. Complementing the magnificence of nature are the works of man. Pachmarhi is also an archaeological treasure-house. In cave shelters in the Mahadeo Hills is an astonishing richness in rock paintings. Most of these have been placed in the period 500-800 AD, but the earliest paintings are an estimated 10,000 years old.



Pench Tiger Reserve



Pench Tiger Reserve (Madhya Pradesh) is a 292.85 km² (113.07 sq mi) project Tiger reserve located in the Seoni District and Chhindwara District of southern Madhya Pradesh in central India. It is contiguous on the south with the 257.23 Km² (99.32 sq mi) Pench Tiger Reserve (Maharashtra), both of which are included in the level 1, 13,223km² (5,105 sq mi) Tiger Conservation Unit-31 (Kanha Pench TCU)⁽¹⁾

The Reserve gets its name from the Pench River that flows, north to south, 74 km through the reserve. The Pench River bisects the Pench reserve into two nearly equal parts; the 147.61 km² of the Western Block which falls in the Gumtara Range of the Chhindwara Forest Division and the 145.24 Km of the Eastern Block in the Karamjhiri Range of the Seoni Forest Division.

H.H. Shri Mataji Nirmala Devi's The Divine Birth Place

H.H. Shri Mataji Nirmala Devi, founder of Sahaja Yoga was born on March 21, 1923 at this divine place Chhindwara, India. Her parents were Prasad Salve and Cornelia Salve, direct descendants of the royal Shalivahana dynasty. Seeing the beauty of this child who was born with a spotless brilliance, they called her Nirmala, which means 'Immaculate'. Later on, She came to be known by the multitudes by the name of H.H.
